Lobbying YOUR MPP

some tips to get you on your way ...



Did you know...

meeting with your local Member of Provincial Parliament (MPP) is a powerful, personal way to influence decisions made by government in Ontario.

Meeting your MPP can be easy and will benefit you and your community



Why is it a good idea to meet with your MPP?

- ⇒ You have an opportunity to build relationships with your local representative for Ontario.
 - MPPs have a say in what laws are adopted by our province and can hold the government to account on key provincial issues
- ⇒ Your MPP needs to know what issues are most important to you.
 - Your MPP maybe unaware of some issues that matter to you, or may not bring up issues in the legislature that constituents do not raise in meetings or in correspondence
- ⇒ You have the opportunity to influence how your province works.

What you need to do

Set up a meeting

- Send an email, mail a letter, or call your MPP's constituency office requesting a meeting on the issues that are important to you.
- You may have to follow up with a phone call or an email a few times before you get a meeting.
 Don't despair! Keep trying and you will get your meeting.



Prepare

This may sound intimidating, but it's quite simple—know your issue and know what you are going to talk about.

- Write down the key issues you want to discuss
- Conduct some research and find statistics to make your case—a few statistics would be just fine. Remember—your experience, or the experience of a friend or a client, will be a powerful tool that will give a voice to the research
- You don't need to reinvent the wheel. Check out the websites listed on the back of this brochure for information that you can use at the meeting.
- Pick a 'task' and an 'ask' for the MPP. E.g. the **ask** is to champion affordable housing issues in the constituency. The **task** is to meet with local nonprofit housing organizations, or ask a specific question in the legislature.

At the meeting

You will most likely have 30 minutes. The MPP's staff will present at the meeting.



- ⇒ Stay confident. Your MPP is your representative and should know of your concerns
- ⇒ Be polite and respectful to everyone at the meeting, including your MPP
- ⇒ If your MPP diverts the conversation, wait for your turn to speak and try to bring the conversation back to the main issues that you want to discuss
- ⇒ Give your MPP the 'ask' and the 'task'
- ⇒ Ask if your MPP requires any further information—be helpful!
- ⇒ Thank the MPP for his/her time
- ⇒ Ask for staff contact information so you can follow up on the meeting and the 'asks' and 'tasks'
- ⇒ Send a thank you email or letter to the MPP's office and reiterate what was discussed and the next steps agreed to
